Oyster Ball Update

One day in the not-too-distant future, Curl Curl Lagoon could be home to many happy oysters. With powerful filtration capacity of up to 7.5 litres an hour, these molluscs may be part of the solution to issues of pollution and turbidity.

By carefully introducing small numbers of oysters in protective habitat – reef balls – it's hoped some water quality improvement will be detected.

CCLF is keenly interested in this idea conceived by environmental scientist, Jason Rusczyk of Northern Beaches Council, and marine researcher, Dr Victoria Cole.

Pre deployment surveys will take place around April and May to get an idea of fish and aquatic diversity with a view to deploy the reef balls in June. Test would run over the next 12-18 months into 2018.
