This is fun. And it's a great way to leave the world a better place than you found it.



Harry's nemesis: Turkey Rhubarb



Acetosa Sagittata, aka Turkey Rhubarb, is a weed worth being able to identify and remove. Look for an arrow-head shaped leaf, long stems tinged with red and butterfly-like flowers arranged like bunches of grapes. Bag any flowers as soon as you can to prevent seed spreading. Follow the stems down into the ground to find the carrot-like tuber, yank it out and shout hooray.
