Authorised Bike Jump area in JFP

Curl Curl Lagoon Friends and Northern Beaches Council took the initiative to establish an off-road bike jump area in John Fisher Park at the eastern end of the netball courts. This is the only authorised area for creating bike jumps using clean fill provided (rather than contaminated landfill).

We've been saddened to see trees destroyed, creek banks damaged and native habitat ruined by small groups seeking to make bike jumps elsewhere in the park. This kind of vandalism is illegal and we ask local parents to help educate young people on the value of the environment and the importance of respecting and preserving it.

Dune restoration project

Aerial imagery of the northern-most sand dune on Curl Curl Beach shows it is the fastest landward moving dune on the northern beaches! You might notice the dune top is currently flattened and path to the beach from the mid-beach car park has completely disappeared.

Current impacts are the inundation of 7000 square metres of coastal vegetation and accelerated sedimentation of Curl Curl Lagoon.

Northern Beaches Council has received NSW Government funding under the Coastal and Estuary Management Grants scheme to implement dune restoration along Curl Curl Beach.



The project aims to install dune-forming coir meshed fences to reduce pedestrian access and wind movement of the sand, while maintaining good access to the beach. Sand will be scraped to shape the dune and reduce sand near the mouth of the lagoon, 6000 native coastal species will be planted with 200 coir logs and 1000 tree guards to better protect the plants.

Keep an eye out for updates on planting days coming soon.

Optus Tower – unwelcome changes

Principal Certifying Authority, BuildCert, has issued a construction certificate for the Optus tower – but with significant changes that have not been subject to community consultation. These include larger footprints for infrastructure, fencing around the tower and elevated platform, as well as installation of a satellite dish.

Curl Curl Lagoon Friends and John Fisher Park Residents Group have requested that our local community be provided with proof of compliance with the conditions of DA2020/0661 approval. We have made a GIPA request for construction certificate documentation and appealed to our local councillors for support in securing information and holding Council to account. We encourage members to voice any concerns to Northern Beaches Council, Build Cert and our local councillors.
