What's that Bird?



The crested pigeon is the only native dove regularly seen in the park. There have been up to thirty of them, quietly fossicking for grass seeds on the soccer fields north of the lagoon. Their call is a soft but startled upward-inflecting "wooh!", but they are better known for the characteristic whirring, squeaky noise of their feathers as they fly off, and the jerky alternating mad flap-glide combination in flight.

Australia has an interesting group of native doves, and aside from this and the introduced Rock Doves and Spotted Doves, we occasionally get one or other much more exotic native doves like topknot pigeons or white-headed pigeons, maybe a brown cuckoo-dove or bar-shouldered dove. If the winds favour us, we might even be so lucky as to see one of the colourful fruit dove species blown in one day.

Floating Wetland Project

Curl Curl Lagoon Friends and Northern Beaches Council are working together on a pilot project using a floating wetland to see if it can help improve water quality in the Curl Curl Lagoon.

The project will see the testing of aquatic plants over the coming months using lagoon water in a dedicated aquaculture tank.

The innovative approach will try to establish which of the plants make the best base for a floating wetland.

If successful, the pilot could see a permanent floating wetland on the lagoon, offering a safe habitat for birds, as well as filtering and cleaning the lagoon water.

with Northern Beaches Council's Coasts & Catchments team on operations.


The project is receiving funding from a grant under the federal Dept of Industry, Innovation & Science's Community Environment Program.
